

## ***Regular Verbs***

### ***Simple Present, Simple Past and Present Perfect Tenses***

This is a list of Regular Verbs. These verbs use **-ed** for the simple past tense and the past participle. The **-ed** ending sounds like /d/

I will read the base form, the simple past tense and the past participle of the verb. Then, I will read the verb in three sentences, a simple present tense sentence, a simple past tense sentence and a present perfect tense sentence.

There will be time for you to repeat the verbs and sentences. Try it, it is good practice!

Answer	answered	answered	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		I <i>answer</i> the questions in class every day.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		I <i>answered</i> the questions in class yesterday.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		I <i>have</i> just <i>answered</i> the teacher's questions.
Boil	boiled	boiled	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		She <i>boils</i> water for tea every morning.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		She <i>boiled</i> water for tea this morning.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		She <i>has boiled</i> water for tea for many years.
Borrow	borrowed	borrowed	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		He usually <i>borrow</i> s money from his family.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		He <i>borrowed</i> \$10 from me last week.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		He <i>has</i> already <i>borrowed</i> \$10 from me.
Call	called	called	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		I <i>call</i> my mother every Sunday.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		I <i>called</i> my mother last Sunday.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		I <i>have called</i> my mother every Sunday for two years.
Carry	carried	carried	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		You always <i>carry</i> your books to school.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		You <i>carried</i> your books to school today.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		You <i>have carried</i> your books to school for 2 weeks.

Clean	cleaned	cleaned	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		She <i>cleans</i> her apartment every weekend.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		She <i>cleaned</i> her apartment last weekend.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		She <i>has cleaned</i> her apartment every weekend for a month.
Cover	covered	covered	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		The women always <i>cover</i> their hair with scarves.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		The women <i>covered</i> their hair this morning.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		The women <i>have covered</i> their hair for many years.
Cry	cried	cried	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		The baby <i>cries</i> every night.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		The baby <i>cried</i> last night.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		The baby <i>has cried</i> since this morning.
Die	died	died	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		Some very sick patients <i>die</i> in the hospital.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		My father <i>died</i> ten years ago.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		My mother <i>has died</i> recently.
Enter	entered	entered	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		They <i>enter</i> the workplace every day.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		They <i>entered</i> the workplace last night.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		They <i>have entered</i> the workplace for 2 years.
Fail	failed	failed	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		He <i>fails</i> the driver's license test every time.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		He <i>failed</i> the driver's license test yesterday.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		He <i>has failed</i> the driver's license test six times!
Fill	filled	filled	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		You <i>fill</i> out job applications every week.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		You <i>filled</i> out a job application last night.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		You <i>have filled</i> out many job applications since last month.

<b>Base</b>	<b>Past</b>	<b>Past Participle</b>	<b>Sentences</b>
Happen	happened	happened	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		An accident <b>happens</b> every week.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		An accident <b>happened</b> last week.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		An accident <b>has happened</b> every week since June.
Hire	hired	hired	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		The business <b>hires</b> new employees every month.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		The business <b>hired</b> a new employee last month.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		The business <b>has</b> already <b>hired</b> ten new employees.
Hurry	hurried	hurried	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		We always <b>hurry</b> to catch the bus.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		We <b>hurried</b> to catch the bus yesterday morning.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		We <b>have hurried</b> to catch the bus since last year.
Live	lived	lived	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		My sister <b>lives</b> in Minnesota now.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		My sister <b>lived</b> in New York three years ago.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		My sister <b>has lived</b> in Minnesota for two years.
Marry	married	married	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		The Judge <b>marries</b> couples every week.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		The Judge <b>married</b> a couple last week.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		The Judge <b>has married</b> three couples this week.
Offer	offered	offered	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		The manager <b>offers</b> new jobs every week.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		The manager <b>offered</b> a new job last week.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		The manager <b>has</b> already <b>offered</b> me a new job
Open	opened	opened	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		We <b>open</b> the restaurant every morning.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		We <b>opened</b> the restaurant yesterday morning.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		We <b>have opened</b> the restaurant for three years.

Order	ordered	ordered	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		They <b>order</b> hamburgers for lunch every day.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		They <b>ordered</b> hamburgers for lunch yesterday.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		They <b>have ordered</b> hamburgers every day since last October.
Own	owned	owned	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		They <b>own</b> their home now.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		They <b>owned</b> their home last year.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		They <b>have owned</b> their home for one year.
Plan	planned	planned	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		The family <b>plans</b> their vacation every year.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		The family <b>planned</b> their vacation last year.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		The family <b>has planned</b> a vacation for many years.
Play	played	played	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		The children <b>play</b> in the park every day.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		The children <b>played</b> in the park yesterday.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		The children <b>have played</b> in the park for two hours.
Prefer	preferred	preferred	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		Jose always <b>prefers</b> to drink coffee.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		Jose <b>preferred</b> to drink coffee last night.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		Jose <b>has preferred</b> to drink coffee since he was young.
Pull	pulled	pulled	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		Daniela <b>pulls</b> the door shut every night.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		Daniela <b>pulled</b> the door shut last night.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		Daniela <b>has pulled</b> the door shut since she moved there.
Rain	rained	rained	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		It <b>rains</b> almost every day in the summer.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		It <b>rained</b> all day yesterday.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		It <b>has rained</b> for three days.

<b>Base</b>	<b>Past</b>	<b>Past Participle</b>	<b>Sentences</b>
Reply	replied	replied	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		I always <b>reply</b> to all of the interview questions.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		I <b>replied</b> to all of the interview questions yesterday.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		I <b>have</b> just <b>replied</b> to all of the interview questions.
Smell	smelled	smelled	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		He <b>smells</b> the delicious food every night.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		He <b>smelled</b> the delicious food last night.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		He <b>has</b> just <b>smelled</b> the delicious food.
Smile	smiled	smiled	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		The shy girl always <b>smiles</b> for the photographer.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		The shy girl <b>smiled</b> for the photographer last year.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		The shy girl <b>has</b> just <b>smiled</b> for the photographer.
Snow	snowed	snowed	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		It <b>snows</b> a lot every winter in Minnesota
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		It <b>snowed</b> a lot last winter.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		It <b>has snowed</b> for three days!
Spell	spelled	spelled	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		He always <b>spells</b> his name slowly.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		He <b>spelled</b> his name slowly yesterday.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		He <b>has spelled</b> his name slowly for many years.
Stay	stayed	stayed	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		I <b>stay</b> home every weekend.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		I <b>stayed</b> home last weekend.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		I <b>have stayed</b> home every weekend for a month.
Stir	stirred	stirred	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		The young woman <b>stirs</b> her tea.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		The young woman <b>stirred</b> her tea yesterday.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		The young woman <b>has stirred</b> her tea for a few minutes.

Study	studied	studied	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		Christina <b>studies</b> English five days a week.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		Christina <b>studied</b> English last week.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		Christina <b>has studied</b> English for 1 ½ years
Travel	traveled	traveled	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		The boys <b>travel</b> to Texas every year.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		The boys <b>traveled</b> to Texas last year.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		The boys <b>have traveled</b> to Texas since they were young.
Turn	turned	turned	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		The man <b>turns</b> right onto the freeway.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		The man <b>turned</b> right onto the freeway yesterday.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		The man <b>has just turned</b> right onto the freeway.
Vacuum	vacuumed	vacuumed	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		The housekeeper <b>vacuums</b> the carpet every day.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		The housekeeper <b>vacuumed</b> the carpet yesterday.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		The housekeeper <b>has just vacuumed</b> the carpet.
Worry	worried	worried	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		The girls always <b>worry</b> about their family.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		The girls <b>worried</b> about their family last week.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		The girls <b>have worried</b> about their family since they moved to Minnesota.
Yell	yelled	yelled	
	<i>Simple present tense</i>		The men <b>yell</b> in the street.
	<i>Simple past tense</i>		The men <b>yelled</b> in the street last night.
	<i>Present perfect tense</i>		The men <b>have yelled</b> in the street for a few hours.
