Conversation Cirriculum

Dessert: Ordering and Restaurant Interactions

Lesson Objective: Students will gain practice in typical restaurant conversations –asking questions about a menu and expressing opinion

Before class: Review lesson plan and packet content. Make copies as necessary.

Materials Needed: Food Photo Flashcards*: apple pie, chocolate cake, strawberry shortcake, cinnamon rolls, pudding parfait, ice cream sundae, cookies

2 mini white boards for 'They do' activity

*NOTE: If cards are unavailable, make copies of the two papers in the packet. (Scanned versions of the photo cards)

15 minutes: Warm-up activity: Layout dessert photo cards.

Ask students questions/prompts (point to card):

- What is this?
- What is in it?
- o How does it taste?

Encourage students to talk to each other about what is represented in each picture and their own preferences

*NOTE: All students define these pictures in their own words (i.e. strawberry shortcake' can be called 'cake')

10 minutes I do/We do activity (10 minutes):

Ask each student to explain dessert and whether they would like it if they tried it.

- Introduce students to restaurants with sheet of photos of customers and servers at an ice cream shop
- Ask students to identify who is in the picture, looking for the terms **customer** and **server**. Write these two words on the board and solicit definition from class.
- Model 'They do' with a volunteer, both pretending to be customers at a restaurant.

20 minutes They do activity: *Students pair up. 1 student will have menu A and the other will have menu B.*

- Students will first have to <u>ask each other questions</u> in order to fill in the missing information in their menus.
- Choose one student to be the 'server', preferably an advanced-level student. Ask the class "What does a server do?" and establish that the server takes the customer's order
- Have the rest of the class discuss what they are going to order and have the 'server' go around to each group and take their order.

*NOTE: Teacher or volunteer can also play the role of the server

15 minutes Journal Writing:

Students will write in their dialog journals about one of the four options:

- Respond to the last entry (i.e. continue the 'dialog')
- Introduce yourself to the teacher (for new students)
- What is your favorite dessert? Why? How is it made? Where do you eat it? Do you order it at restaurants?
- Free-write about a topic of the student's choice
