Tutors and mentors support literacy skills, social-emotional skills, and relationship building for elementary-aged (K-5) students, with the ultimate goal of interrupting the generational cycle of homelessness. Reading Tutors work 1:1 with a child at our transitional housing site for 60 minutes once or twice a week. Staff prepare the literacy lessons and materials and are available on site for support. Hours are M-Th, 5:00-6:00 pm. Literacy Mentors work 1:1 with a child in our scattered site programs for 60 minutes once a week. Staff prepare the literacy lessons and materials, but tutoring takes place according to the mentor and mentee's schedules at various public libraries across the west metro. In addition to weekly tutoring, mentoring pairs attend monthly enrichment outings.

Volunteers must be 21+ and pass a criminal background check. Reading Tutors serve October-May; we will accept applications all year, but cannot guarantee a full-time match after the start date. Literacy Mentors serve during the school year; we will accept applications until our school year cohort is full (usually late September). Applications received after that will be held for the next year's cohort.

Homework Center Tutor

The St. Paul Public Library Homework Center has homework drop-in centers where we serve all grades and ages, K - College. It's a busy, fast-paced environment with many visitors each day. The Library staff pairs tutors with students according to their skills and the students' needs, in order of arrival. Each session is about 30 minutes, then the tutor switches to the next student. Students may sign up for multiple tutor sessions in a day. SPPL Homework Centers are comfortable spaces at the library where students can drop in and work on their homework independently or with the help of volunteer tutors. Volunteers assist students with homework, create a welcoming atmosphere at the homework centers, and act as positive role models for students of all ages.

Reading Together

Volunteers meet one-on-one with a student in grades 1st-5th for one hour per week for one school year. The goals are to foster an enjoyment of reading and create a positive mentoring relationship. As a reading mentor, you will develop rapport with the student and support their individual growth and engage with literacy activities and games. Tutors must be proficient in reading and writing. Most of the students come from families who speak English as a Second Language and are underperforming in reading tests at school.
