# Bridges Housing Assistance Program Navigation Guide



"Do you need help paying your rent?"

"Have you or an adult in your household been diagnosed with a serious mental illness?"

## **Section 1: Program Information**

**Purpose of the Program**: The Bridges Program helps individuals or families who have at least one adult with a serious mental illness pay for housing. The Bridges program provides assistance until the individual or household becomes eligible for another housing assistance program such as Section 8. Bridges requires the household to apply to or attempt to get on a waitlist for Section 8, and once funding is received from Section 8, funding from Bridges stops. Similarly to Section 8, you will pay 30-40% of your income for housing and Bridges will pay the rest.

**Deadline**: The 2020-2021 funding cycle is currently closed, but you will still want to reach out to a service provider to create an application for when funding becomes available.

**Contact Information**: Bridges has different contacts for different service areas. You must complete an application through a Bridges program staff member. All contact information can be downloaded through this website:



## **Section 2: Eligibility Requirements**

**Basic Eligibility**: The exact income limits vary by area, and can be found by visiting the Housing and Urban Development website here:

https://www.huduser.gov/portal/datasets/il.html. Households with lower than 50% of median income may qualify. In the Twin Cities Metro Area, here are the average limits, although it can vary from city to city. In addition, at least one adult family member must have a serious mental illness and you must have attempted to apply for or be on a waitlist for Section 8.



**NOTE:** HUD generally uses the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) area definitions in the calculation of income limit program parameters. However, to ensure that program parameters do not vary significantly due to area definition changes, HUD has used custom geographic definitions for the **Minneapolis-St. Paul-Bloomington, MN-WI HUD Metro FMR Area**.

The Minneapolis-St. Paul-Bloomington, MN-WI HUD Metro FMR Area contains the following areas: Anoka County, MN; Carver County, MN; Chisago County, MN; Dakota County, MN; Hennepin County, MN; Isanti County, MN; Ramsey County, MN; Scott County, MN; Sherburne County, MN; Washington County, MN; Wright County, MN; Pierce County, WI; and St. Croix County, WI.

- Bridges gives priority to individuals in the following circumstances:
  - Homeless
  - o Living in a psychiatric hospital
  - Living in a community-based residential treatment facility
  - Living in substandard and unaffordable units

## **Section 3: Application Process**

You will complete the Bridges application working with the Local Housing Authority and the Bridges Program Contact.

A mental health professional will have to verify a serious mental illness
diagnosis for you or another adult member of your household
That you are on a waitlist or attempted to apply for Section 8

## Section 4: Expectations (What will happen?)

## What is the timeline for receiving services?

- Currently the 2020-2021 funding cycle is closed, and Bridges is not currently accepting applications
- However, it is best to contact your Bridges Program Contact to begin working on a competitive application for when additional funding becomes available.

## With whom will participants be communicating?

You will communicate with the local housing authority as well as your Bridges

## What additional steps must participants take to receive services?

- If you qualify for a Bridges Housing voucher, you will still need to find a place to live.
- The place will have to be within size and rent limits, and the landlord must accept Bridges as payment
- You can find places to live through HousingLink
   (<a href="https://www.housinglink.org/">https://www.housinglink.org/</a>), looking at bulletin boards in the community, searching newspaper ads, getting recommendations from people you know, by asking your PHA or nonprofits that help with housing, or by working with your Bridges Caseworker
- You must remain on a waitlist for Section 8 while receiving Bridges funding
